arnstine shows how schools have been distracted from education by reformers urging higher standards the code word for higher test scores but education is revealed in the dispositions a person has sensitivity and resourcefulness amiability and responsibility taste wit and a disciplined intelligence this book examines the conditions needed to foster dispositions like these for they are not acquired by having the young spend more time studying standard academic subjects in preparation for competitive tests without recourse to esoteric jargon democracy and the arts of schooling shows why test scores are less significant than the quality of the experiences students have in school when that quality is high when it has the richness and the absorbing character we associate with the aesthetic then learning takes place

the book reveals how the social value of art may have one meaning for a policy maker another for a museum and still yet another for an artist and it is therefore in the interaction between these agents that we learn the most about the importance of rhetoric and interpretation as a trajectory in art history socially engaged art has a long and established history however in recent years or since the social turn that occurred in the 1990s the rhetoric surrounding the social value of art has been assimilated by cultural policy makers and museums interdisciplinary in its approach and bringing together contributions from artists curators and academics the volume explores rhetoric social value and the arts within different social political and cultural contexts

evaluates the institutional economic and political influences on the creation of art while also affirming the importance of the question of artistic quality the author examines the arts in the social contexts in which they are created and appreciated focusing on the ways in which people become artists the institutions in which their careers develop the supports and pressures they face the publics they need to please and the political forces with which they must contend particular subjects covered include the process by which works are created and re created at different times with changed meanings and for new social uses the role of the audience in the realization of artistic experiences the social consequences of taste preferences the reasons for change in artistic styles and for the coexistence of many art forms and styles

larry shiner challenges our conventional understandings of art and asks us to reconsider its history entirely arguing that the category of fine art is a modern invention and that the lines drawn between art and craft emerged only as the result of key european social transformations during the long eighteenth century publisher s description

imagination has long been regarded as central to c s lewis s life and to his creative and critical works but this is the first study to provide a thorough analysis of his theory of imagination including the different ways he used the word and how those uses relate to each other peter schakel begins by concentrating on the way reading or engaging with the other arts is an imaginative activity he focuses on three books in which imagination is the central theme surprised by joy an experiment in criticism and the discarded image and shows the important role of imagination in lewis s theory of education he then examines imagination and reading in lewis s fiction concentrating specifically on the chronicles of narnia the most imaginative of his works he looks at how the imaginative experience of reading the chronicles is affected by the physical texture of the books the illustrations revisions of the texts the order in which the books are read and their narrative voice the storyteller who becomes almost a character in the stories imagination and the arts in c s lewis also explores lewis s ideas about imagination in the nonliterary arts although lewis regarded engagement with the arts as

essential to a well rounded and satisfying life critics of his work and even biographers have given little attention to this aspect of his life schakel reviews the place of music dance art and architecture in lewis s life the ways in which he uses them as content in his poems and stories and how he develops some of the deepest most significant themes of his stories through them schakel concludes by analyzing the uses and abuses of imagination he looks first at moral imagination although lewis did not use this term schakel shows how lewis developed the concept in that hideous strength and the abolition of man long before it became popularized in the 1980s and 1990s while readers often concentrate on the christian dimension of lewis s works equally or more important to him was their moral dimension imagination and the arts in c s lewis will appeal to students and teachers of both children s literature and twentieth century british writers it will also be of value to readers who wish to compare lewis s creations with more recent imaginative works such as the harry potter series

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
